### THE BIGGEST CLIMATE ISSUE

CAN IT BE RESOLVED?

The words 'global warming' are constantly being thrown about, with people protesting against it and talking about the effects it has on the earth. But do you actually know what these words really mean? Because I didn't until I googled it just before I wrote this article.

Global warming is the longterm heating of the Earth's climate system which has been occurring since the pre-industrial period due to many human activities, mostly the burning of fossil fuels. This increases the levels of greenhouse gases such as carbon dioxide and methane, that trap heat within the

earth's atmosphere. The words 'global warming' are constantly used interchangeably with the term 'climate change' however the latter is not quite the same thing. Climate change is a long-term change in weather patterns that are caused by both human and naturally produced global warming and the effects this has. Since the preindustrial period (1850 to 1900), human activities are estimated to have increased the Earth's global average temperature by about 1 degree Celsius and are currently still increasing it at a rate of 0.2 degrees Celsius per decade. For some of

you readers, you are probably thinking 'what? 1 degree is nothing' but trust me that 1 degree can cause a lot of harm to the earth. And that harm can already be seen around the world.

Many people assume that the effects of global warming are some future problem that will not have any effect on us living today. But that, unfortunately, is not the case. Scientists have already documented impacts of global warming and climate change that can already be seen throughout the world, such as extreme weather events. These can be seen in many countries where their



summers are getting a lot hotter and their winters are getting colder. This is because global warming is weakening the circulation of the North Atlantic Ocean, which plays a very crucial role in the world's climate, including keeping winters in places like western Europe relatively mild. If this weakening continues, the impact on Europe and the US east coast could be extremely serious as winter weather is more likely to become less stable, with more outbursts of extremely cold air from the arctic. However, during the summer it would have the opposite effect and cause extreme heatwayes for

example the 2015 European heatwaves. Other than having hot or cold extremes global warming has also led to extreme weather like changes in hurricane formations. The rising temperatures are also having vast effects on wildlife and their habitats and causing many species like butterflies, foxes and alpine plants to migrate further north or to higher cooler areas.

The melting of the world's ice is another effect of global warming that we can see across the world in today's society. This includes mountain glaciers, ice sheets covering West Antarctica, and Arctic sea ice. Much of this melting contributes to the sea levels rising, which is at 0.13 inches each year, which is a much faster rate than in previous years. Due to this rise in the sea levels there will be future problems as floods and droughts will become more common and hurricanes and other storms are likely to become a lot stronger.

The United Nations has become the only forum to come to an agreement aimed at reducing greenhouse gas emissions. Global warming and the further effects of climate change involves every nation.
